Sherlock Holmes and Dr. Watson: The Early Adventures There is a persistent and incorrect idea, reinforced by countless film misrepresentations, that Sherlock Holmes and Dr. Watson were always staid and dull British chaps of middle years (or older), with Holmes a spry, cranky, and impatient eccentric, and Watson a white-haired and portly Boobus Britannicus, à la Nigel Bruce. Students of the true and Canonical Sherlock Holmes know this to be a falsehood.
